FULL TIME FACULTY

Ruth Milkman, Ph.D. is the Academic Director of the Murphy Institute labor studies programs and a Professor of Sociology at the CUNY Graduate Center. Her distinguished publications include *Gender at Work* and *L.A. Story: Immigrant Workers and the Future of the U.S. Labor Movement*.

Joshua Freeman, Ph.D. is a Professor of History at Queens College and the CUNY Graduate Center. He is renowned for his study of the Transport Workers Union, *In Transit*. His book *Working-Class New York* is an accessible and engaging history.

Stephanie Luce, Ph.D., Associate Professor of Labor Studies, has earned international recognition for her research on living-wage campaigns and on the impact of globalization. She is currently researching labor standards in free trade agreements, and prospects for a regional living wage in Asia.

Penny Lewis, Ph.D., Assistant Professor of Labor Studies, specializes in social movements and is the author of *Hardhats, Hippies, and Hawks: The Vietnam Antiwar Movement as Myth and Memory*. She has been a union organizer and is an officer for the Professional Staff Congress at CUNY.

Ed Ott is a Distinguished Lecturer in Labor Studies with expertise in politics. He has 40 years of labor experience, most recently as Executive Director of the New York City Central Labor Council.

Stanley Aronowitz, Ph.D., Distinguished Professor of Sociology at the CUNY Graduate Center, is a leading scholar of technology and work, education, and social movements. He is a longtime labor activist and author of 23 books, including *Working Class Hero* and *Taking It Big: C. Wright Mills and the Making of Political Intellectuals*.

Frances Fox Piven, Ph.D., Distinguished Professor of Political Science and Sociology at the CUNY Graduate Center, is a prominent scholar and activist. Her groundbreaking books include *Regulating the Poor* and *Why Americans Still Don't Vote*. She has been active in many grassroots social movements from the National Welfare Rights Organization to Occupy Wall Street.

Stephen Brier, Ph.D. is a Professor of Urban Education and coordinator of the Interactive Technology and Pedagogy Program at the CUNY Graduate Center. He co-founded and directed the American Social History Project and co-authored and its widely used multimedia curriculum, *Who Built America?*
